If you answer **often** to any of the questions below, start to take action

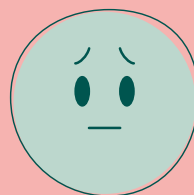
Over the last 2 weeks, how often have you been bothered by the following problems?

Not able to stop or control worrying

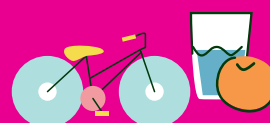
Reduce the risk and severity of these challenges
